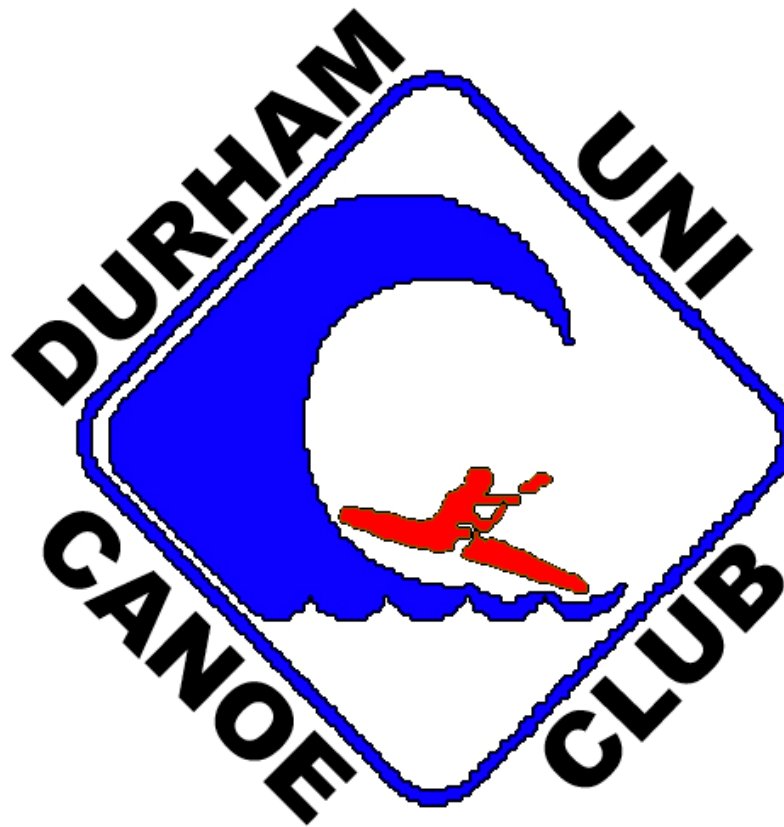

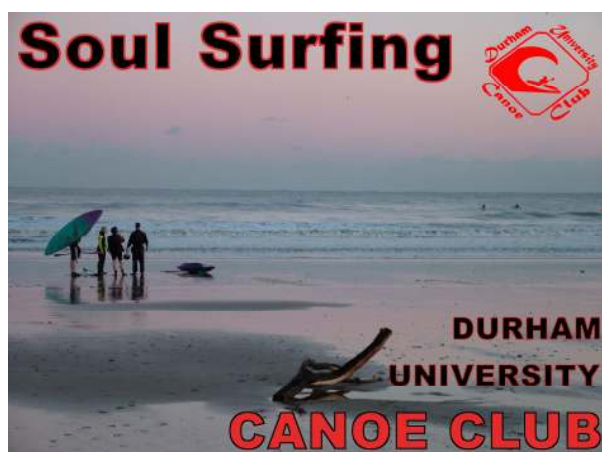
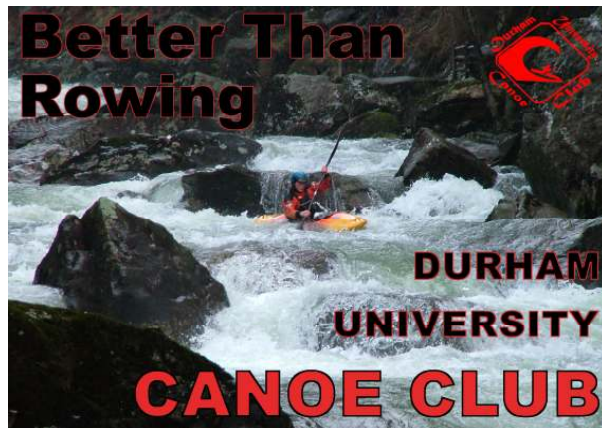

BUSA River Race

The weekend of 11th – 12th November saw over 300 university paddlers converge for the annual BUSA River Race at the River Washburn in North Yorkshire. The aim of this event is to get from the top of the river to the bottom in the fastest time possible whilst negotiating the rapids along its course. Competitors start at half minute intervals, paddling alone usually or with safety kayakers for the less experienced.



Several different disciplines are competed in. These are K1 (1 person kayak), C1 (1 person canoe) and C2 (two person canoe). Apart from the individual classes there is also a men's, ladies and mixed team event. As always DUCC entered a large number of competitors, ranging in ability from white water warriors, competition gurus to relative novices!

The competition started early on Saturday morning with the individual events. Rich Russell-Johnson, Phil Carrivick and Richard Williams were the fastest home for Durham with times respectably sub-10 minutes. Russell-Johnson and Will Coombs also competed in the C1 event with the former finishing in 7th place.

The C2 was the talking point of the weekend! Which Durham crew would get the



fastest time? Three pairs took part; Coombs and Russell-Johnson, Phil Carrivick and Matthew Corke, and Chris Buckley and Williams. The skills required for this event are somewhat different to kayaking. To start with you kneel rather than sit. This makes your centre of gravity higher and therefore the boat more unstable. Secondly whereas in kayaking your paddle has two blades, in canoeing you only have one. Finally, there are two people in one boat. Needless to say

everyone was a little apprehensive! Despite this though, the pairing of Matt Corke and Phil Carrivick came home with the fastest Durham time. Not only that they came third overall winning bronze medals!

The night after the party came the team events. With a great time of 9:58 and bringing home silver in the Men's team event were the Durham trio Russell-Johnson, Carrivick and Williams. The Ladies A team of Charlie Dunkley, Alex Dow and Katie Ellis finished 5th and the Mixed A team finished 6th.

Overall Durham took third place behind Newcastle in second and Loughborough taking top spot. A great result for everyone involved!
